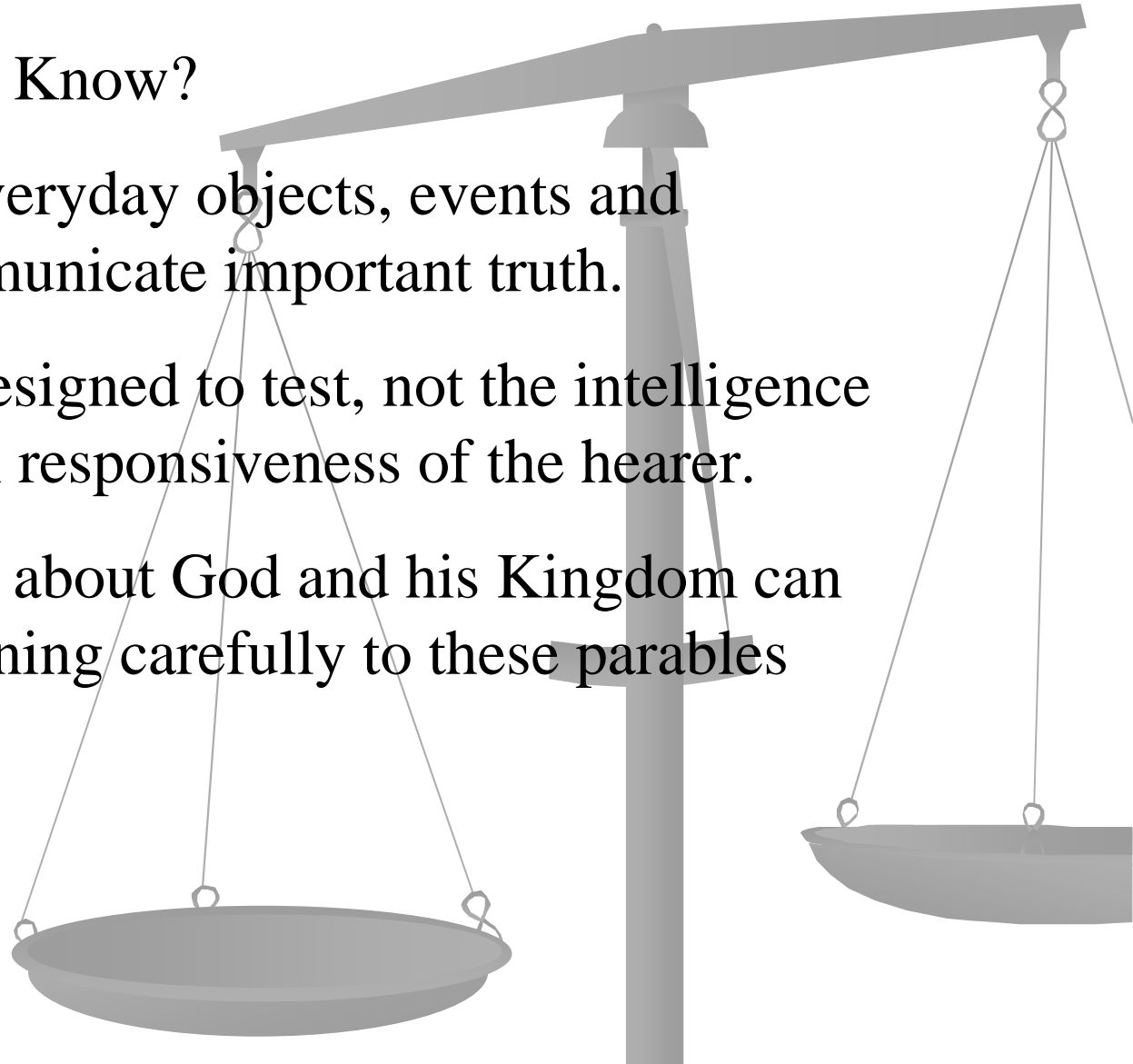


Fair Market Value & God

So Far We Know:

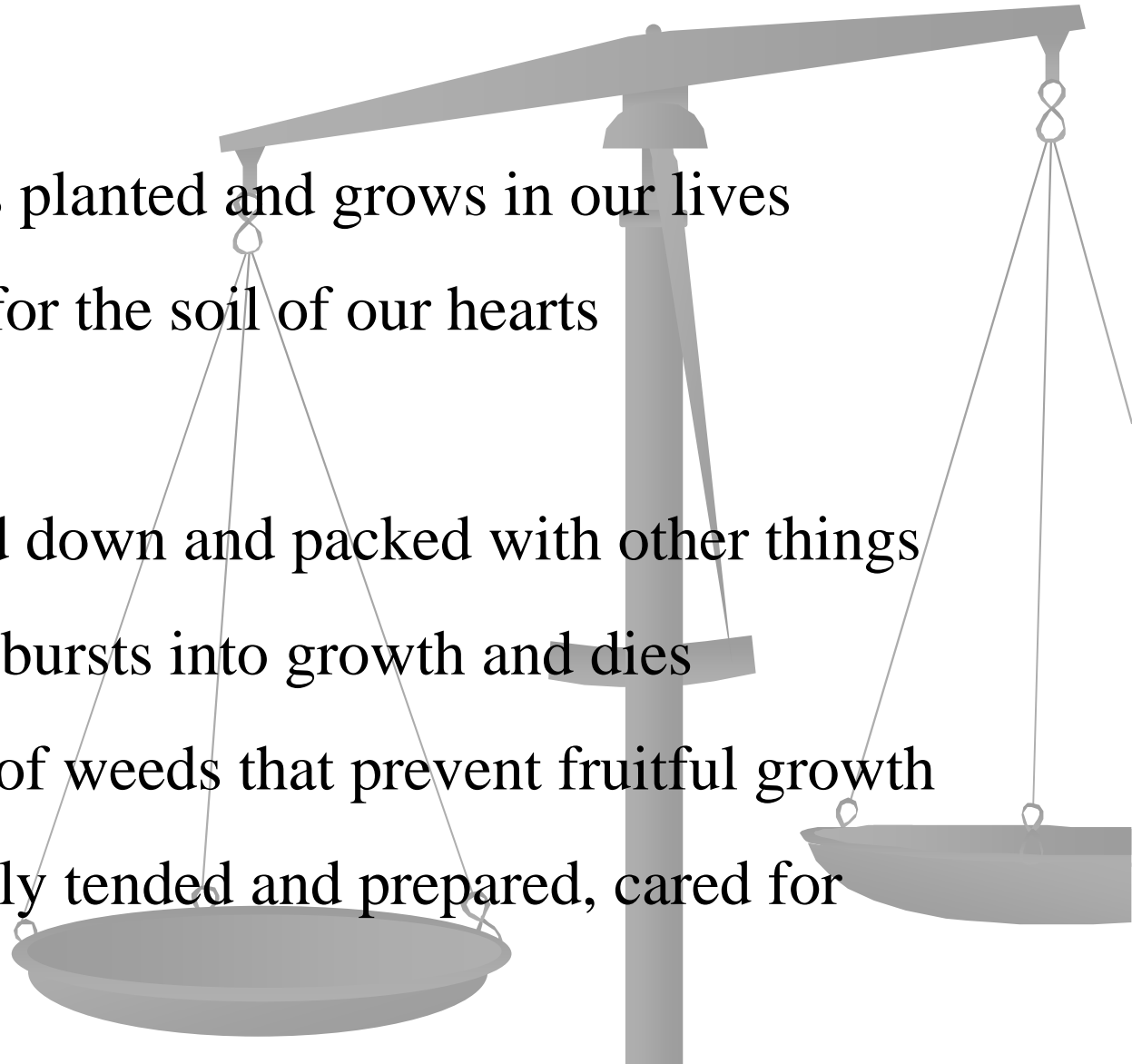
- The Seed of Truth is planted and grows in our lives
- We are responsible for the soil of our hearts
- Soil can be:

Hard - trampled down and packed with other things

Shallow - truth bursts into growth and dies

Crowded - full of weeds that prevent fruitful growth

Fertile - carefully tended and prepared, cared for

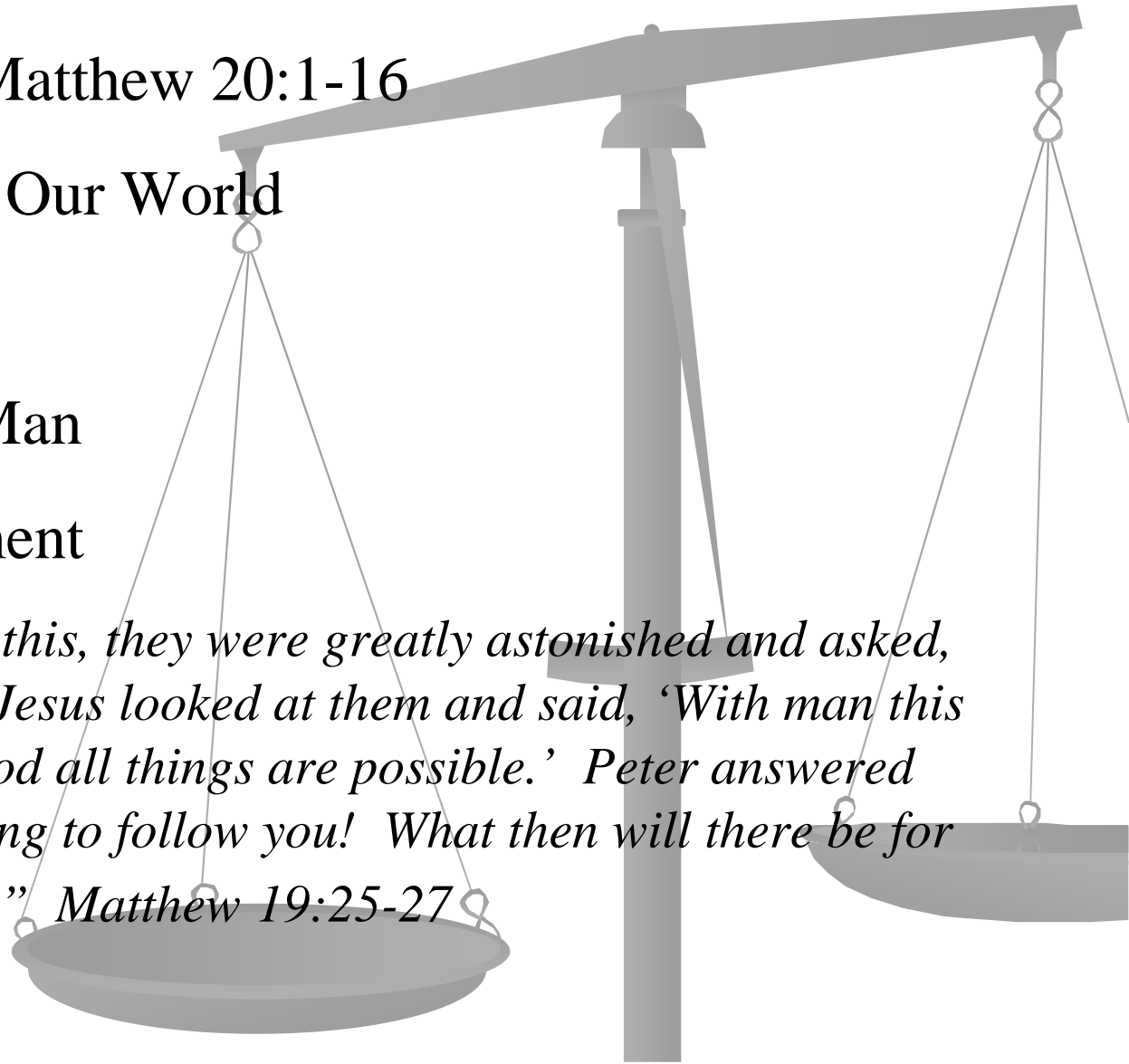

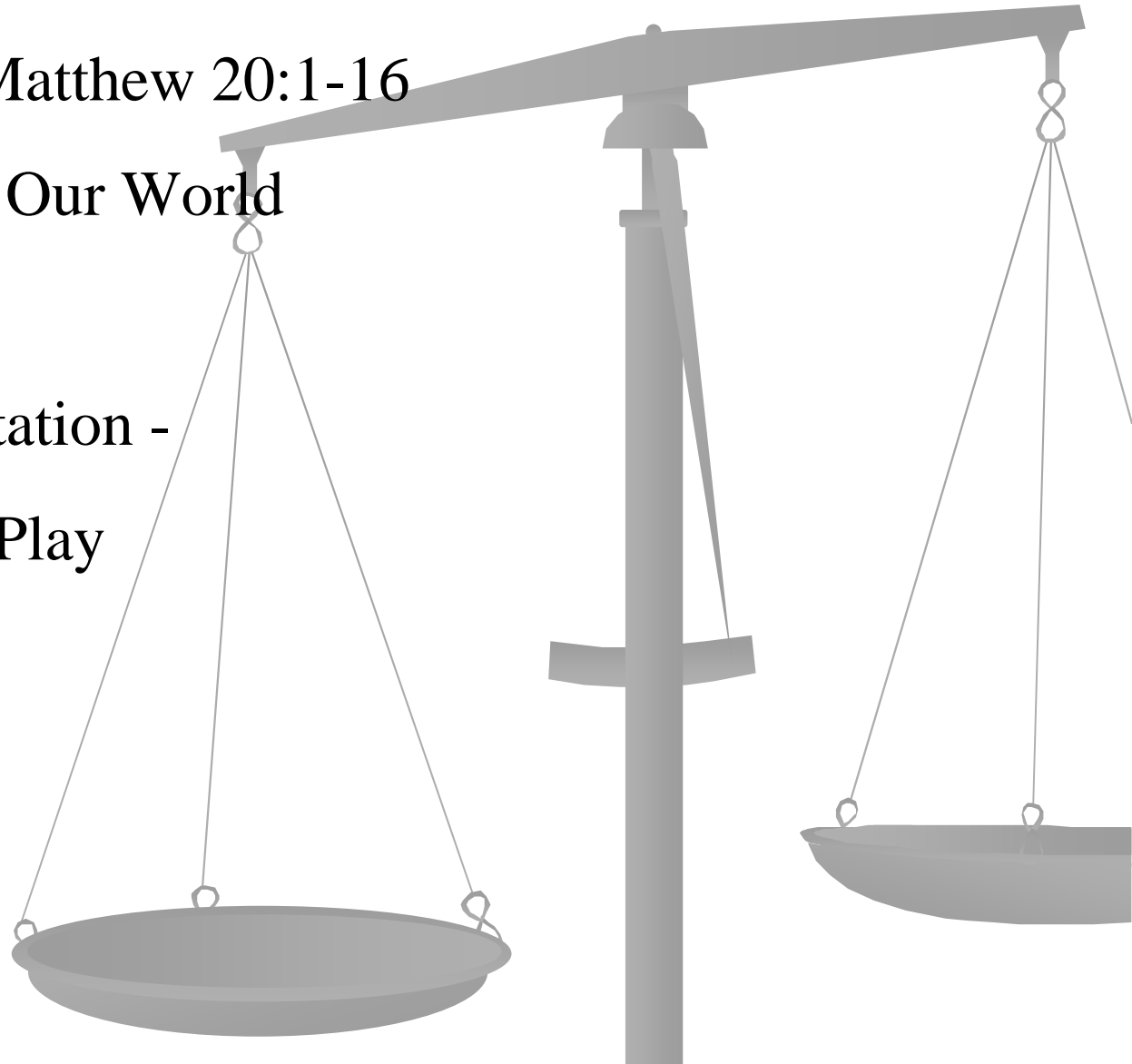

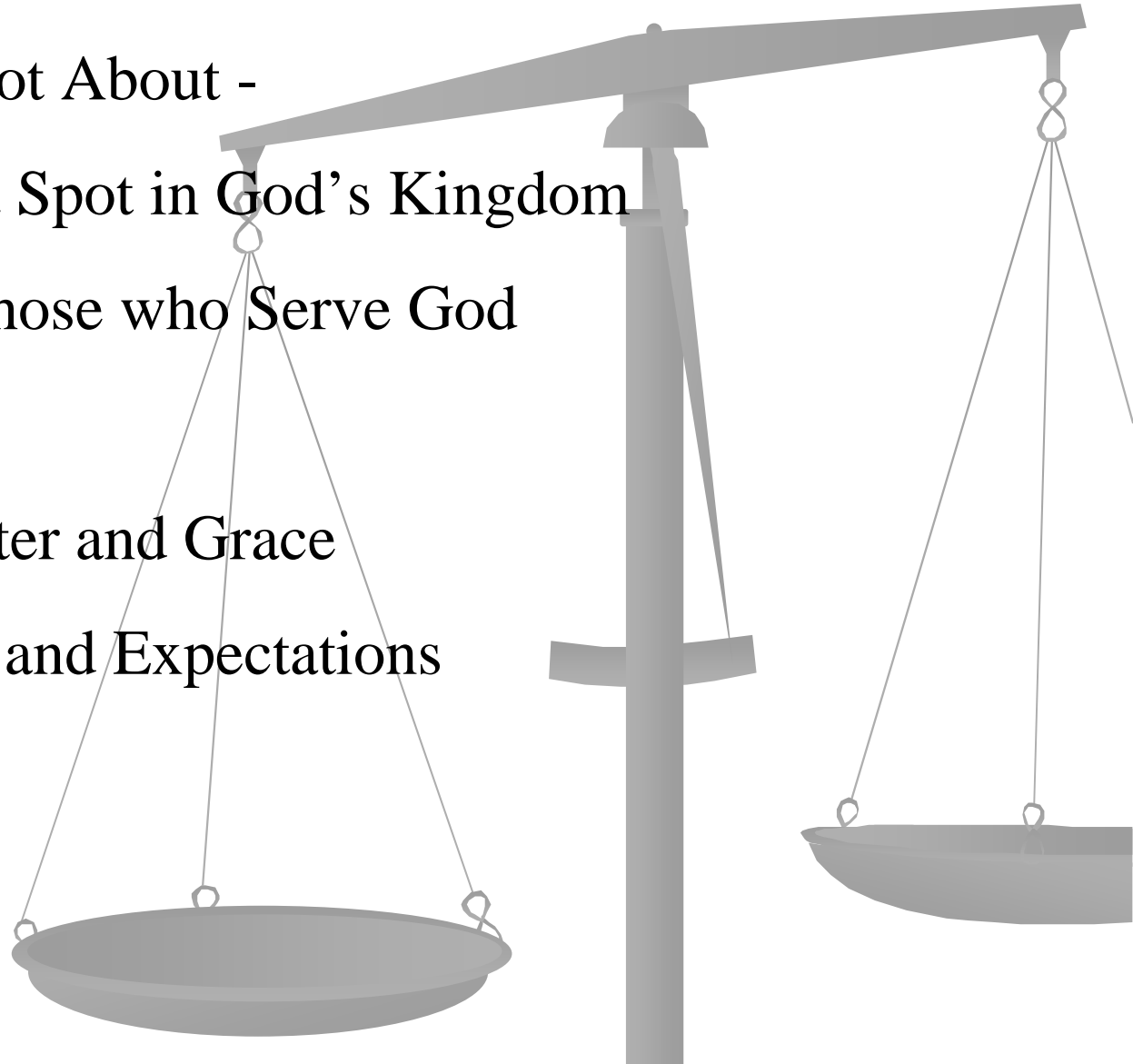

- Our Attitudes and Expectations

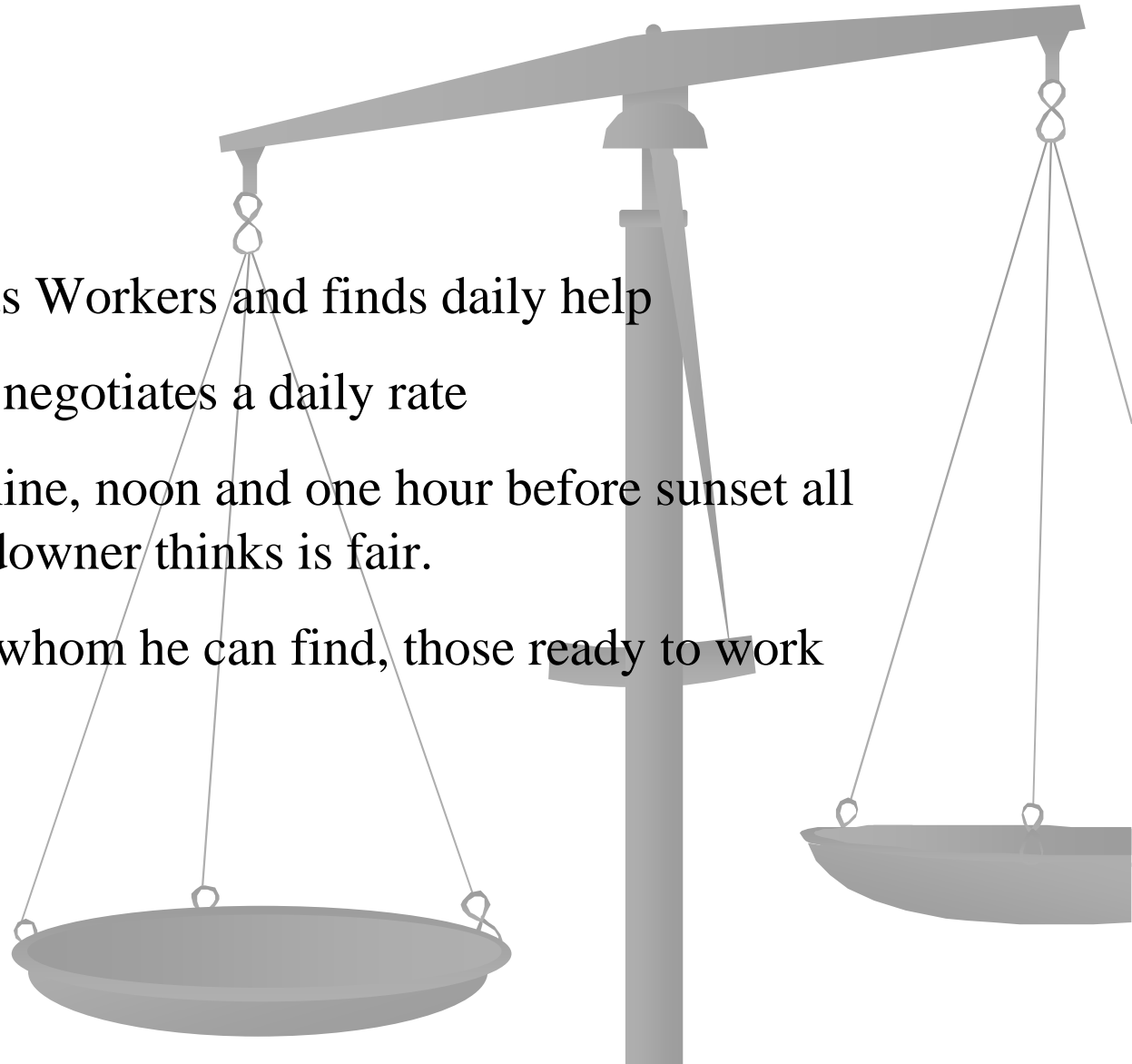


Fair Market Value & God

Simple Observations

1. Hiring Practices

- Landowner Needs Workers and finds daily help
- First group hired negotiates a daily rate
- Groups hired at nine, noon and one hour before sunset all work for what landowner thinks is fair.
- Landowner uses whom he can find, those ready to work

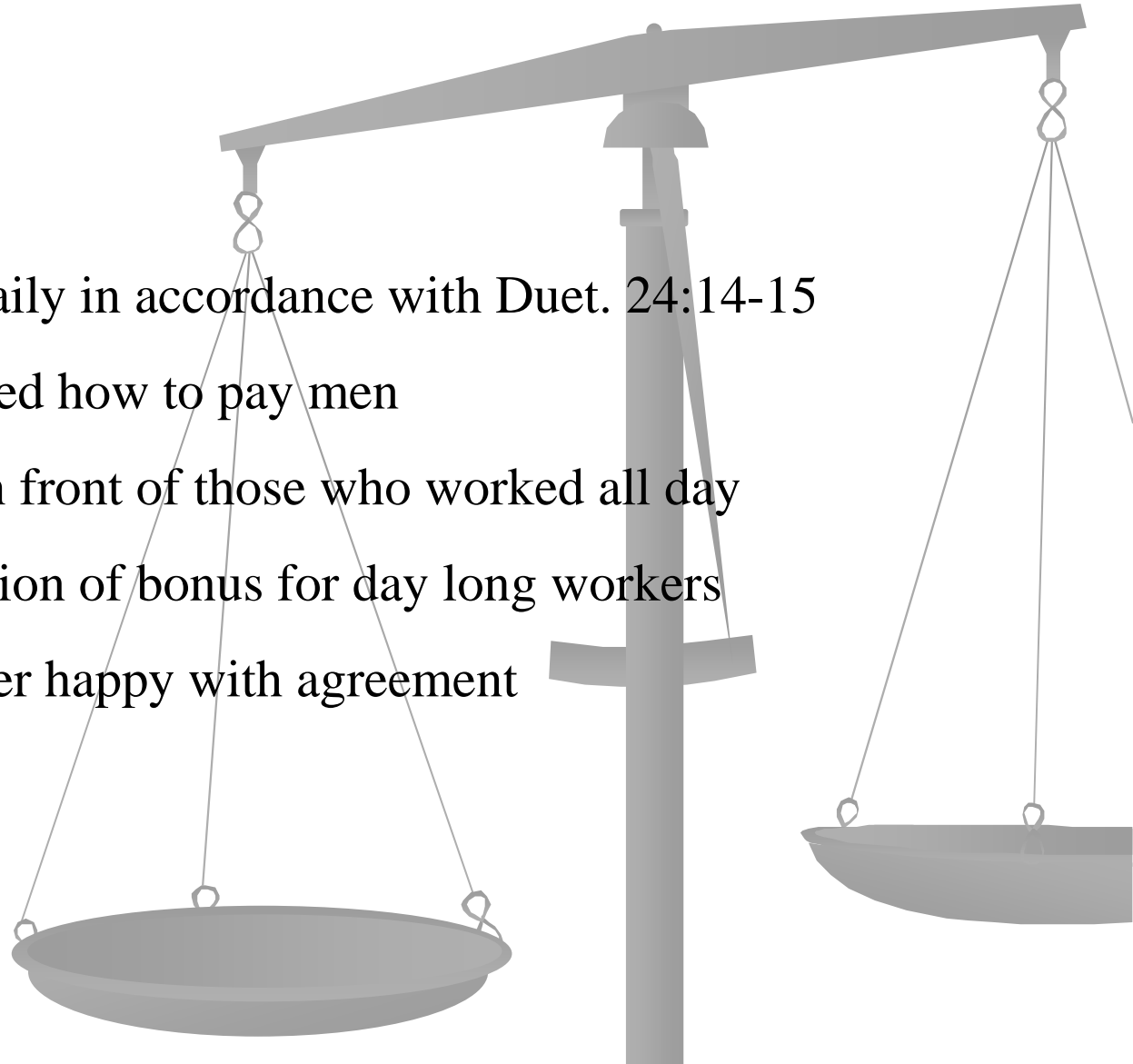


Fair Market Value & God

Simple Observations

2. Payment of Wages

- Payment made daily in accordance with Duet. 24:14-15
- Foreman instructed how to pay men
- Last hired paid in front of those who worked all day
- Created Expectation of bonus for day long workers
- Workers no longer happy with agreement



Fair Market Value & God

Simple Observations

3. Disgruntled Employee's

- Expectations of a generous bonus went unmet vs.10
- They turned on the landowner - sense of fair play offended
- Offended that those hired last “made equal” when they worked all day.
- Unhappy with their contract

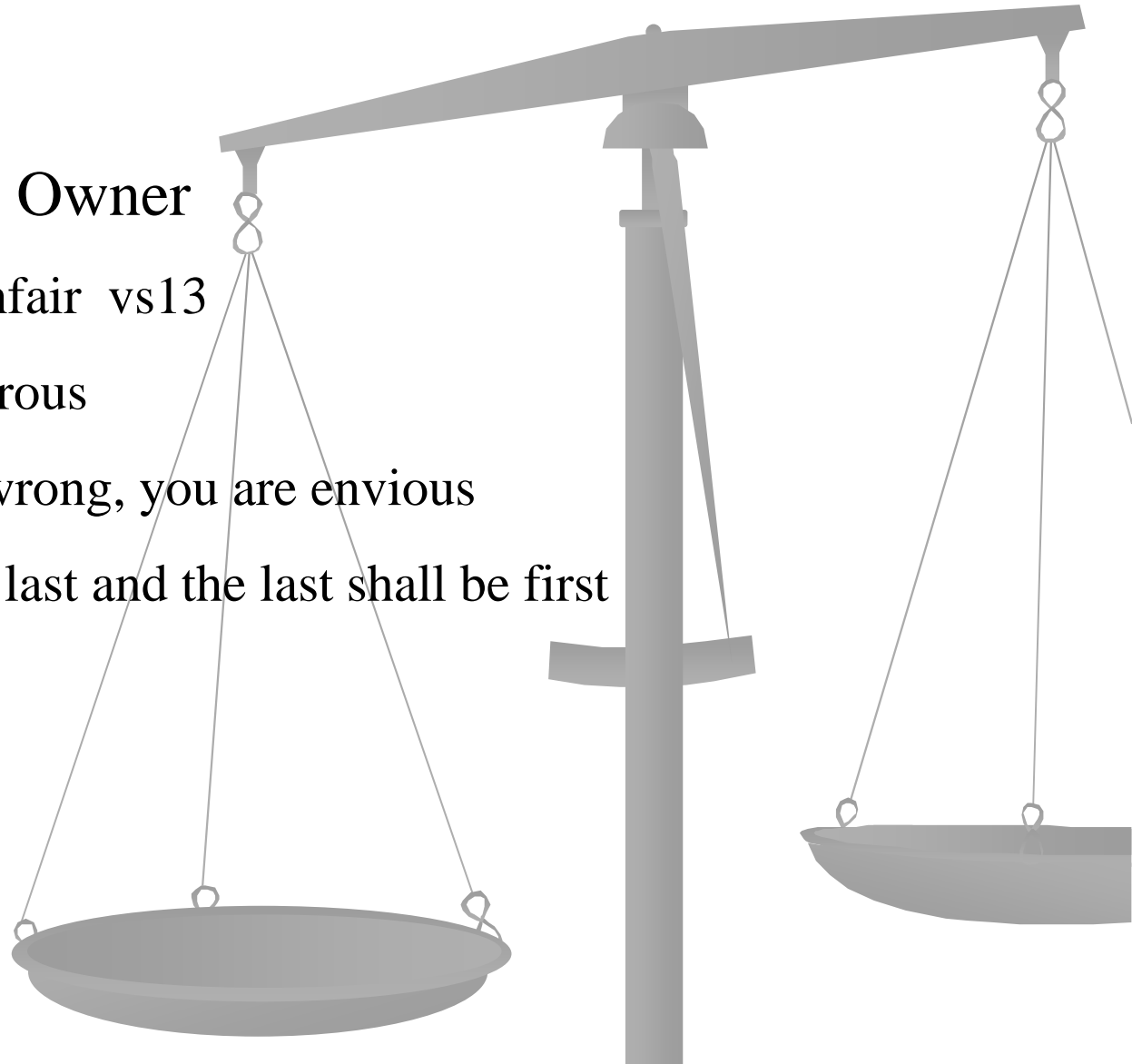

Simple Observations

4. Response from the Owner

- I am not being unfair vs13
- I wish to be generous
- Your attitude is wrong, you are envious
- The first shall be last and the last shall be first

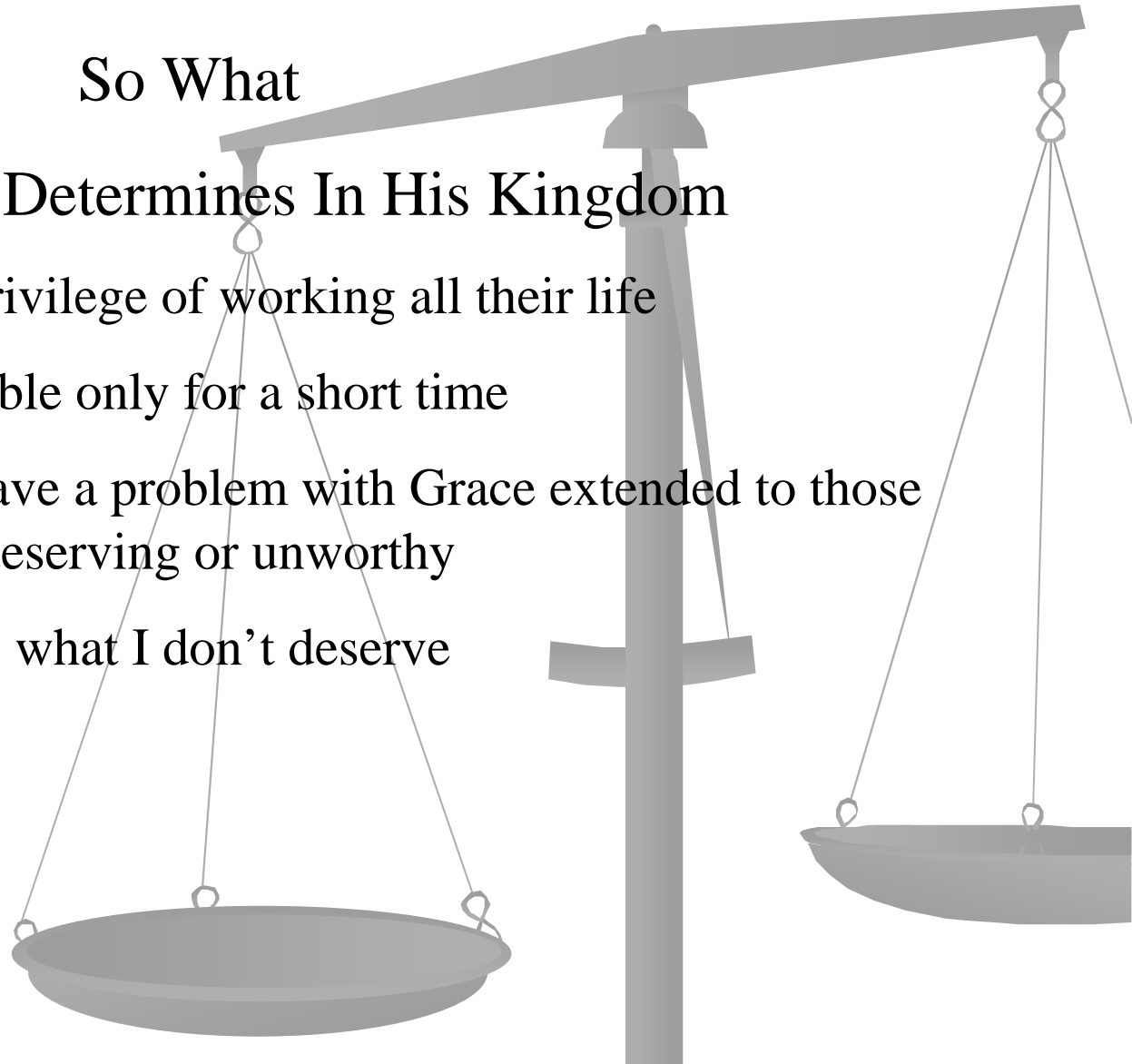


Fair Market Value & God

So What

1. God Uses Who He Determines In His Kingdom

- Some have the privilege of working all their life
- Some will be usable only for a short time
- We sometimes have a problem with Grace extended to those we deem lazy, undeserving or unworthy
- Grace - receiving what I don't deserve

So What

2. God's Grace is His to Bestow Not Ours To Negotiate

- God will decide how his grace and mercy will be extended
- From a human perspective, it often offends our sense of fair play and justice
- It is often visible to us, creating an expectation we have a right to demand the same blessings as given to others

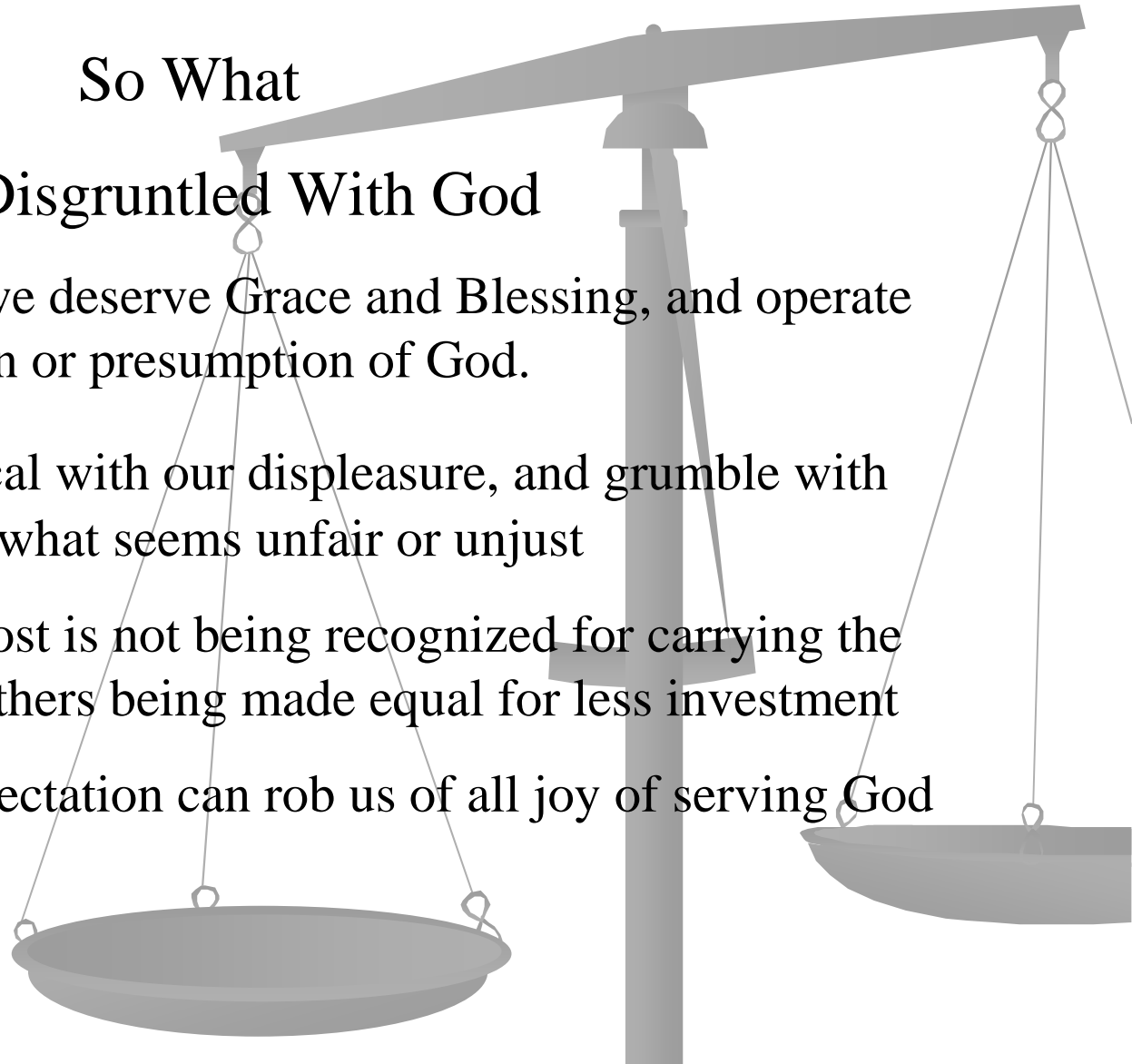

So What

3. We Can Become Disgruntled With God

- We can believe we deserve Grace and Blessing, and operate with an expectation or presumption of God.
- We often are vocal with our displeasure, and grumble with one another about what seems unfair or unjust
- What offends most is not being recognized for carrying the load all day, and others being made equal for less investment
- Attitude and Expectation can rob us of all joy of serving God

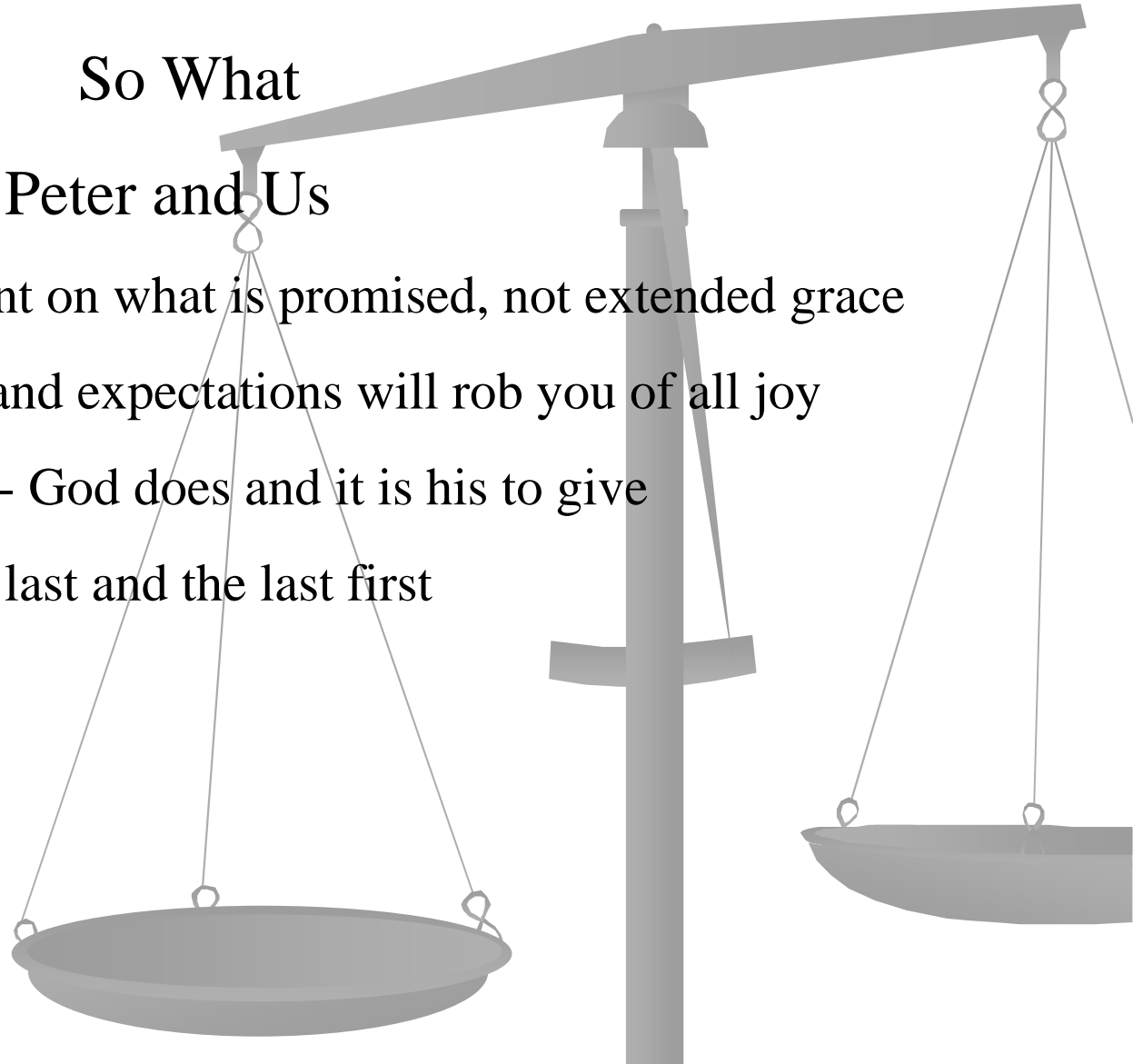

So What

4. God's Response to Peter and Us

- We can only count on what is promised, not extended grace
- Wrong attitudes and expectations will rob you of all joy
- We don't decide - God does and it is his to give
- The first shall be last and the last first
