Parables, What do We Know?

- 1. They used everyday objects, events and images to communicate important truth.
- 2. They were designed to test, not the intelligence but the spiritual responsiveness of the hearer.
- 3. Great insight about God and his Kingdom can be ours by listening carefully to these parables

So Far We Know: "The Dirt In My Life"

- The Seed of Truth is planted and grows in our lives
- We are responsible for the soil of our hearts
- Soil can be:

Hard - trampled down and packed with other things

Shallow - truth bursts into growth and dies

Crowded - full of weeds that prevent fruitful growth

Fertile - carefully tended and prepared, cared for

So Far We Know: "It's Like ..."

The Kingdom of Heaven is Like

God's To Judge - Wheat and Weeds are His to evaluate

God's To Grow -Do for God what He asks, leave results

God's To Change - The Kingdom alters us for all to see

So Far We Know: "Fair Market Value And God"

- 1. God Uses Who He Determines In His Kingdom
- 2. God's Grace is His to Bestow Not Ours To Negotiate
- 3. We Can Become Disgruntled With God
- 4. Wrong attitudes and expectations will rob you of all joy

Today - Parable of The Unforgiving Debtor

Matthew 18:23-35

Setting -

- Disciples argue about who would be greatest
- Jesus gives two warnings
- Jesus shows how to treat a believer who sins
- Peter asks about forgiving others
- Parable

Helpful Hints For Today:

- Wake Up
- Understanding Peter's Question

"Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?" vs21

- "Therefore" - Key to Understanding Parable

Parable not about Salvation, it is told amidst teaching on how to treat one another within the family of God. Forgiving a brother, how we treat one another, all important in the Kingdom of God.

I Owe

1. The Debt

- The King is settling accounts with His servants
- The Debt is ridiculously large
 - 10 000 Talents = entire annual income of kingdom
 - 1 silver talent = 6000 dracma's
 - 1 dracma = average days wage
 - debt is 60 million days wages
 - equivalent to 10 million today

I Owe

1. The Debt

- The King is settling accounts with His servants
- The Debt is ridiculously large
- The King orders a settlement vs. 25
- There is a plea for time vs. 26
 - no grip on reality, time is not relevant

I Owe

2. The King

- Immense amount would make an impact
- How he treated this would be noticed
- There is pity for the man vs.26
- The debt is released

You Owe

1. The Debt

- The Servant is owed a debt
- The amount is small in relation to what he owed
 - 100 denarii = 100 days common labor
 - equivalent to aprox. 3 months wages
- The Servant went looking to settle the debt. Vs.28
- There is a plea for time to pay. Vs. 29

You Owe

2. The Response

- Refusal to ignore the debt or need of repayment
- Imprisons the debtor
 - common practice to put those who owed money and could not repay in jail until debt settled by family.

Oh No!

- 1. The Servants Actions Are Noticed
- 2. The King Takes Action
- 3. Servants Actions bring Consequences
- 4. Jail and Torture are the Result

So What

Three Simple Observations - I Owe, You Owe, Oh No!

We Have Been Forgiven A Debt We Can't Pay

- Deserved To Be Punished
- Granted release when we asked
- There is a difference between receiving forgiveness and experiencing forgiveness.

So What

Three Simple Observations - I Owe, You Owe, Oh No!

There Will Be Things We Must Forgive

- Others will offend and hurt us
- Our Attitude and actions towards them are noticed
- We can only extend forgiveness to others when we experience it in our lives, not simply receive it.
- Often we have the legal right, not the moral right

So What

Three Simple Observations - I Owe, You Owe, Oh No!

How We Forgive Affects Our Relationship With God

- Releasing hurts from our hearts is essential
- Unforgiveness within the body imprisons the people
- If we experience forgiveness, we can extend it to others from a changed heart.
- God is aware of your heart attitude and how you treat others
