... so that the glory that belongs inherently to Him and which will one day be visible to all is at present obscured.

The inauguration of the kingdom by Jesus the Messiah has already taken place, but the outward signs of its presence are as yet very few. It is here, but not with irresistible power. Men can and do reject it.

Indeed, it can be accepted only by those whose hearts have been made ready to receive it, just as seed can produce a crop only when it is sown in ground prepared for its fertilization. That is the essential rewee entite eldisting entite thiog (3-9, 18-23).

(31,32) But because the kingdom has already taken root in some hearts, results are bound to follow. The inevitability of growth from what appears a very small beginning to a result seemingly out of all proportion to it is the truth set forth in the parable of the mustard seed.

Moreover the presence of the kingly reign of God is bound to penetrate the evil environment in which it is exercised as effectively as yeast penetrates and transforms the flour into which it is put (33).

To be sure, the powers of evil, which will not be finally destroyed till the final judgment, will do all they can to resist the kingdom, but their efforts will ultimately be seen to have been to no purpose. That is ent to eldered ent to paintem ent tares (24-30, 36-43).

And the complementary truth that, until the consummation comes, there will always be found along with the bona fide sons of the kingdom those who do not belong to it, is underlined in the parable of the drag-net (47-50).

Finally, because the kingdom of heaven is the only lasting reality, and its worth is so incalculably precious, the person who is really eager to obtain its benefits, once he has been confronted by it, will readily and joyfully make the necessary sacrifice

... whether it be loss of possessions, friends, or even of life itself. That is the teaching of the twin parables of the costly pearl and the hidden treasure (45,46,44)
