- Israel – not following God

- some of the last Kings

- * Jeroboam 1 Kings 12:25ff

- * Nadab – 15:25-27

- * Baasha – 15:34

- * Omri – 16:25-26

- * Ahab – 16:30-33

3 Pictures from our Passage

1. Becoming a Messenger

- Elijah is chosen to deliver a message to the King, that will not be popular or easy for the people



Emptying Your Cup

Now Elijah the Tishbite, from Tishbe in Gilead, said to Ahab, “As the LORD, the God of Israel, lives, whom I serve, there will be neither dew nor rain in the next few years except at my word.”

² Then the word of the LORD came to Elijah:

³ “Leave here, turn eastward and hide in the Kerith Ravine, east of the Jordan. ⁴ You will drink from the brook, and I have ordered the ravens to feed you there.”

⁵ So he did what the LORD had told him. He went to the Kerith Ravine, east of the Jordan, and stayed there. ⁶ The ravens brought him bread and meat in the morning and bread and meat in the evening, and he drank from the brook.





Emptying Your Cup

- led by God to a place of
 - isolation
 - dependence
 - provision
- James 5:17 “Elijah was a man just like us. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. ¹⁸ Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops”


Emptying Your Cup

2. Following God's Leading

“Some time later the brook dried up because there had been no rain in the land. ⁸ Then the word of the LORD came to him: ⁹ “Go at once to Zarephath of Sidon and stay there. I have commanded a widow in that place to supply you with food.” ¹⁰ So he went to Zarephath. When he came to the town gate, a widow was there gathering sticks. He called to her and asked, “Would you bring me a little water in a jar so I may have a drink?” ¹¹ As she was going to get it, he called, “And bring me, please, a piece of bread.”



Emptying Your Cup

- ¹² “As surely as the LORD your God lives,” she replied, “I don’t have any bread—only a handful of flour in a jar and a little oil in a jug. I am gathering a few sticks to take home and make a meal for myself and my son, that we may eat it—and die.”
- ¹³ Elijah said to her, “Don’t be afraid. Go home and do as you have said. But first make a small cake of bread for me from what you have and bring it to me, and then make something for yourself and your son. ¹⁴ For this is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: ‘The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the LORD gives rain on the land.’”
- ¹⁵ She went away and did as Elijah had told her. So there was food every day for Elijah and for the woman and her family. ¹⁶ For the jar of flour was not used up and the jug of oil did not run dry, in keeping with the word of the LORD spoken by Elijah.

Emptying Your Cup

a) went where God sent

- 100 miles away, being hunted
- home town of Jezebel
- sent to a widow – no resources
- had to ask for help

* had the promise of God:

- already commanded her
- will provide for you there



Emptying Your Cup

b) response of the widow

- I have no resources
- I have nowhere to turn
- I have no more hope

c) care and call of Elijah

- 'don't be afraid'
- do what God asked and trust
- hear and hold his promise



Emptying Your Cup

d) actions of the Widow

- make the 1st for the Man of God
- put the promise into action
- live each day with that faith

3. Pleading with God

- we see Elijah pour his heart to God in concern for this family



Emptying Your Cup

Some time later the son of the woman who owned the house became ill. He grew worse and worse, and finally stopped breathing.

¹⁸ She said to Elijah, “What do you have against me, man of God? Did you come to remind me of my sin and kill my son?”

¹⁹ “Give me your son,” Elijah replied. He took him from her arms, carried him to the upper room where he was staying, and laid him on his bed. ²⁰ Then he cried out to the LORD, “O LORD my God, have you brought tragedy also upon this widow I am staying with, by causing her son to die?” ²¹ Then he stretched himself out on the boy three times and cried to the LORD, “O LORD my God, let this boy’s life return to him!”



Emptying Your Cup

The LORD heard Elijah's cry, and the boy's life returned to him, and he lived. ²³ Elijah picked up the child and carried him down from the room into the house. He gave him to his mother and said, "Look, your son is alive!"

²⁴ Then the woman said to Elijah, "Now I know that you are a man of God and that the word of the LORD from your mouth is the truth."



Emptying Your Cup

a) death and an unusual response

- 'reminded me of my sin'

b) Elijah goes to God

- persists until he has an answer

- 3 times beseeches the Lord

- answer is restored life

- God is recognized as the power



Emptying Your Cup

So What

1. Called to be Messengers
 - you will be my witnesses....
 - can have the message rejected
 - can lead to places of isolation, depending solely on God, accepting his provision for needs.
 - God will supply in these times

2. Will you Offer what you have?
 - when God asks, will you offer it?
 - will you act first in faith, knowing God will be faithful to his people
3. Are you able to Plead with God
 - not demanding your way
 - waiting on a response
